- Continue to utilize our One-to-One Device program to advance student learning.



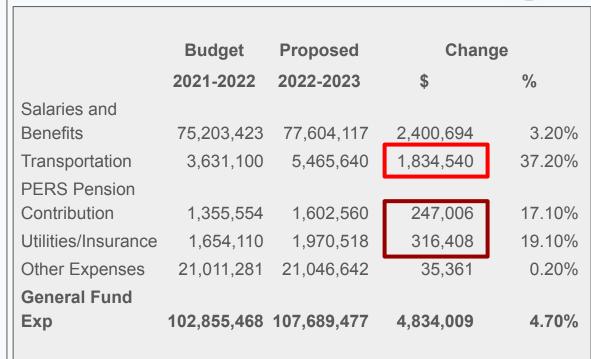
District Enrollment Trend - As of October 15

General Fund Budget Overview - Expenses

- Unprecedented and historic increases in costs
- Bus driver shortage is leading to a decrease in service and an increase in costs
- The state continues to push **pension** costs down to the local level
- Natural gas prices have increased by almost 50%; workman's compensation insurance is higher due to the pandemic
- All other expenses held flat but inflation is reducing our purchasing power
- Cost mitigation planning has started

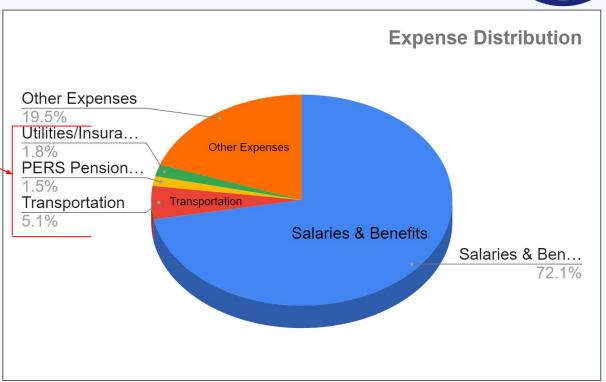






General Fund Budget Overview - Expenses

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General Fund Budget Overview - Expenses - Other Expenses

- Other expenses driven by Out of District Tuition and Special Education Services
- Limited flexibility related to costs
- Technology costs continue to increase
- Vast majority of purchases are done through a competitive bid process to ensure the lowest cost
- Maintenance costs are stable because we maintain our own staff. External contractor use is minimized

- \$15.1M Bond Referendum was passed in 2001
- Refinanced in 2010 to lower the payments
- 38% debt reduction in 2022-2023 that lowers the effect of the annual tax increase
- Remaining debt will be paid off in the 2022-2023 school year
- Enrollment increases are expected due to new residential developments
- New Bond Referendum planning has started due to capacity concerns
