REACH FOR THE READING STARS! McGinn Summer Book Challenge


Dear McGinn Students & Parents,

- McGinn students have expanded their vocabularies and enhanced their fluency.
- McGinn students have done a great job passing along recommendations to their classmates, which is a terrific way to generate interest in specific series or genres.
- McGinn students have become better writers. Their creativity has bloomed and their ability to put words on paper has been helped by their reading experiences.



Students who read the most books will be inducted into the McGinn Summer Reading Hall of Fame, will have their names placed in a special place outside of the library and receive a small prize. Depending on the number of books students read, they will earn recognition in a specific category, this year using a Mission to Mars theme.

The books chosen should be "Just Right" books and fit your reading level. Have fun with the challenge and enjoy all those books this summer.
