Course Name: Advanced Placement Music Theory

Course #: H6600 Grades 10 – 12 Level: 0 Year: 5X Credits: 5

Advanced Placement (AP) Music Theory is an applied music course for the music student who hopes to major in music in college and/or pursue a career in music after high school, or for the student who wants a more in-depth and advanced knowledge of the complexities of music. The course consists of the detailed study of musical elements, tonal and rhythmic dictation, analysis of melodies as well as full pieces, sight-reading, and composition. Home preparation, tests, quizzes, and in-class performances will be a regular part of the course. The timeline for completion of the course will be aligned with the Advanced Placement schedule.
