Course Name: Grade 5 Social Studies

Course Description:

Addressing the earliest aspects of U.S. History, this is the first chronologically-based study of history in the scope and sequence. Students examine the origins of humanity and development of complex cultures in Africa, early human migrations to the North American continent and the development of complex cultures among Native Americans, followed by European exploration and settlement, cultural conflicts, and the establishment of the American colonies. The course challenges students to consider the consequences of forced migration and voluntary immigration and the ways that these diverse cultures interact, establish systems of power, and manage conflict in North America during the 17th and 18th centuries. The study ends with the challenges and events that will eventually lead to the American Revolution. Throughout the course, students apply the disciplinary tools and concepts from civics, economics, geography and history to deepen their understanding of the human societies that were first established in North America. Thematic concepts, including how geography impacts culture, the characteristics of successful societies, cultural conflicts and multiple perspectives are woven throughout each unit of study to prepare students for their future social studies experiences.

- 14. Recognize the value of diverse cultural beliefs and practices present in early American history, contributing to the cultural heritage of the United States. (6.1.5.CivicsDP.3, 6.1.5.HistoryCC.2)
