Students Create Juneteenth Quilts to Represent Freedom

To commemorate Juneteenth, elementary students learned about the history of slavery in the Scotch Plains-Fanwood area during social studies lessons. The students read about how Juneteenth was the day in 1865 when more than two years after President Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation, enslaved Americans in Galveston, Texas, finally received word that they were free from bondage. Students in third and fourth grades participated in a special culminating Juneteenth project where they viewed examples of quilts and symbols used to represent different personal experiences. Then, students worked together to select ideas, design, and create unique Juneteenth quilt squares out of muslin, a historic fabric used for quilts.

Each third and fourth grade class in the district composed one quilt piece representing what freedom means to them. The quilt pieces will be sewn together to produce a SPF Juneteenth quilt for next year's recipient of the Social Justice Matters Juneteenth Festival honoree. Last year's quilt was presented to our honorees at the June 20 SPF Board of Education Meeting.



Junior at SPFHS Attends USA Brain Bee Championship in Florida

After claiming first place at the NJ Regional Brain Bee, Shaheryar Zeb, a Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School junior, traveled to Florida to compete against 53 scholars in the USA Brain Bee Championship. The three-day competition boasts rigorous challenges including a written exam, a patient diagnosis test, a sheep brain dissection, and identifying various brain structures of an MRI.

"It was exhilarating being in a live competition. I think my heart was beating 120 beats per minute," said Shaheryar. "It allowed me to showcase my ability and knowledge. Having my family there in the crowd made the moment of finding out that I had won the NJ Regional Brain Bee even more surreal."



Participating in this competition did not check off a graduation requirement but rather a personal goal that has now blossomed into a desired career pathway in neuroscience. Plenty of hard work and time management went into preparing for the national championship. He estimates he spent around 150–200 hours studying – and jokes that the experience was "a good return on that investment."

At the NJ Regional Brain Bee, Shaheryar met Professor Steven Levison who organized the competition. He thanked Professor Levison for acting as a mentor in the process and providing college-level study materials leading up to the USA Brain Bee Championship.

The regional competition win not only secured him a spot at the national bee, but also a research grant with Rutgers University. This summer Shaheryar will intern with Professor Marc Tambini at the Rutgers Brain Institute, working on Alzheimer's research.

"I have always been interested in pursuing the medical field in the future," Shaheryar said. "Preparing and participating in the Brain Bees taught me about related neuroscience fields and gave me perspective into what I'd be learning in college. They have boosted my fascination with neuroscience."

More than competing in the USA Brain Bee Championship, Shaheryar is an International Biology Scholar. He received that designation after placing in the top five percent of test takers who reside outside of Canada and took the 2024 National Biology Competition. He placed 13 out of the 2488 students internationally that sat for the exam. He thanked Scotch Plains–Fanwood Public Schools for hosting the competition. Otherwise, he would not have been able to participate as no other school nearby was holding the competition.

That's where Guida Faria, Supervisor of Science, Engineering and Gifted & Talented K–12, met Shaheryar; She administered the National Biology Competition exam. After the exam, he casually told her he would be heading to the University of Central Florida to participate in the USA Brain Bee Championship that weekend.

"As the supervisor of science, Shaheryar's initiative makes me feel

immensely proud of our program," said Faria. "It shows the dedication our teachers have in encouraging students to look for opportunities to practice skills and explore science outside of the classroom. We are proud to support our students in their pathways."

Shaheryar credits these exams for perfecting soft skills like time management that he will need well into the future. Reflecting on the exams, he encourages his peers to "be diligent in opportunities available" and says that no matter the outcome, "what you get out of the competition, seeing your effort realized, that's even more rewarding."

In addition to these competitions, Shaheryar is looking forward to competing in the US Medicine and Disease Olympiad in July.
